Running In Circles

Originally designed to make coasters, mug rugs, or cord managers using precut, double-sided, fusible interfacing, the Running in Circles Design Pack has limitless possibilities for appliqué or embroidery on garments, towels, handbags, totes, ornaments, quilts, or table runners. Use individually or place multiples on the project to create one of a kind designs. Experiment with different thread types such as variegated thread to make the design uniquely your own.



Point of Interest

- Use pretty thread in the bobbin, as well as the needle, when stitching coasters, cord managers, towels, or ornaments. The finished embroidery design is visible on both sides of these projects. Bobbin thread may be appropriate for other projects.
- The best stabilizer for most of these projects is a water-soluble stabilizer. The stabilizer could vary depending upon the finished project.
- When stitching the decorative designs inside the circles, use a temporary spray glue or glue stick rather than double sided tape. It's difficult to remove tape when stitched into the design. The difference is the circle designs stitch around the tape. The decorative designs stitch into the tape. Another option is sticky water-soluble stabilizer.
- The stitching sequence on the circle designs uses varying colors of thread to differentiate the steps for placement of the coaster double sided fusible interfacing. It is not necessary to change colors of thread until the decorative design changes.

Stitching the Circle Design for Coasters


Step 1

To begin, hoop water-soluble stabilizer. Choose desired embroidery design. Stitch first color sequence. This is the outline circle for coaster double sided fusible interfacing placement.



Step 2

Fuse fabric circles to each side of the coaster double sided fusible interfacing with right sides showing. Be sure to use plenty of steam with the iron set on the wool setting for proper fusing.



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
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Step 3Place small piece of double sided Scotch tape on back side of coaster.



Step 4 Position on hooped outline stitch.




Step 5Stitch zigzag—2nd stitching— to hold coaster placement for decorative embroidery stitching.



Step 6

Stitch 3rd thread color of design. This could be the same thread color throughout design or a contrast thread color. It's your choice.



Step 7Complete final stitching of design.



Step 8

Trim excess stabilizer from design. Use warm water to remove remaining stabilizer.

There is no one recipe for this design pack. Thread color, fabric choices, and design combinations offer a multitude of opportunities to stitch/play with circles and embroidery on projects.
